While the renovation is underway, we have ensured that all families were seamlessly transitioned to a hotel at our expense, reaffirming our unwavering commitment to their well-being during this transitional period.

Deepening Our Commitment to DEI

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) remain central to our mission, and in 2024, we took bold steps to further this commitment. Establishing a dedicated DEI committee has allowed us to create and implement specialized programs designed to support families in more engaging and diverse ways.

A BEACON OF HOPE

The Benjamin Family Story

For many families, the Ronald McDonald House® is a name they recognize—a place they may have passed by or heard about in passing. But for Monique Reboe-Benjamin and her family, it became much more than that. It became a home, a support system, and a beacon of hope during one of the most challenging times of their lives.

A LIFE-CHANGING DIAGNOSIS

Monique and her husband, Ushane, welcomed their daughter, Mikaiah, in March 2024. Initially, everything seemed fine, and they were discharged from the hospital within 24 hours. However, once home, they noticed something wasn't right. Mikaiah was cold, struggling to feed, and her condition wasn't improving.

A lactation consultant, who also happened to be a nurse, urged them to take Mikaiah to the emergency room immediately. What started as a concern over feeding soon escalated to a whirlwind of medical tests. Initially, doctors suspected bronchiolitis, but then a doctor noticed a heart murmur. Monique and Mikaiah were quickly flown to a specialized hospital in Edmonton while Ushane and their son Micah made the long six hour journey by car. The family was told to pack for a short stay likely seven to ten days.

What was supposed to be a simple procedure turned into something far more complex. Mikaiah needed a heart transplant. Within days of arriving in Edmonton, Mikaiah was placed on a left ventricular assist device while waiting for a transplant. Suddenly the family found themselves navigating a 245-day journey, with 241 of those days spent at the Ronald McDonald House®.

At first, the Ronald McDonald House® was simply a place to stay close to the hospital. But as time went on, it became an invaluable source of comfort and support.

One of Monique's most cherished memories from their stay revolved around her son, Micah. On his birthday, the family hadn't had the time or energy to plan a celebration.



But in a quiet, thoughtful gesture, a volunteer at the House slipped Monique a small envelope and whispered, "Tuck this into his lunch bag."

Later that day, Micah discovered the card adorned with hand-drawn pictures of his favourite things—a soccer ball, a Minecraft character, and his beloved hockey player. His face lit up with pure delight.

"That was the best part of his birthday," Monique recalls, her voice thick with emotion. "It made the day feel extra special. It showed us that this wasn't just a place to sleep. This was home, and these people had become our extended family."

Moments like these weren't isolated—they were woven into the fabric of their time at the House. Ushane fondly remembers the Summer Foam Party, a carefree afternoon where laughter filled the air. For a brief moment, he could set aside his worries and just be present with Micah, the two of them locked in a playful sword fight, wielding pool noodles as if they were knights defending a castle.

It wasn't just grand gestures that made a difference; it was the quiet kindness of the staff and volunteers who checked in regularly, offering support in the smallest yet most meaningful ways—a warm conversation in the kitchen or the shuttle van, a shared smile in the hallway, or the simple act of helping families find community with each other.

Throughout their stay, Monique and her family met other parents going through similar medical journeys. Some isolated themselves, unsure if they belonged. They encourage families to embrace the support that Ronald McDonald House® offers.

"The House is not just a place to sleep. It's a place to unwind, to forget a little about the hospital, to recharge and take care of yourself," she shares. "It helped us visualize a future beyond this difficult phase."

Today, Mikaiah is home with her family in Saskatoon, thriving under the care of a dedicated medical team. While they are grateful for their time at the Ronald McDonald House®, they are even more grateful for the opportunity to be home.

"We love you guys," Ushane says, reflecting on his time at the House. "But we're happy to be home now, spending more time as a family."



The expansion of the Ronald McDonald House® in Calgary was our organization's most transformational story of 2024. Years of planning came to fruition as construction largely started and finished in 2024.

It was no easy feat to realize the ambitious dream of expansion. From fundraising to logistics, RMHC Alberta team members, the Board of Directors, our Expansion Committee, our partners at Faction and Westcor and all of the companies attached to the project dug their heels in to mitigate challenges and keep the project on budget and on time.

In October of 2024, we had to close the Ronald McDonald House® for a portion of the construction — families were moved to a partner hotel, Sandman Signature Calgary West, at no cost to the family and could stay there as long as their child was in treatment. Programs, services, meals, and more remained on-site at the hotel for families who had a child being treated in the hospital.

In May 2025, after nearly two years of construction, we were overjoyed to officially open the doors of our expansion, both welcoming back families and beginning journeys with new ones.

The new and improved spaces of Calgary's expanded Ronald McDonald House® include the Family Services Lounge, Rec Room and Magic Room, South Kitchen, Den, Studio, South Playroom, Living Room, Family Suites, and



an Outdoor Amenities area. These spaces will greatly enhance our ability to provide families with the care, comfort, and compassion they need to feel at home when staying with us.

The expansion includes 91 Family Suites (newly built and renovated), each featuring beds, an en suite bathroom with a private water closet, storage, and a comfortable amount of space, ensuring families have everything they need to feel at ease during their stay.

The new South Kitchen includes a walk-in fridge and freezer, a soup kettle, and a serving station with hot chafing dishes. Here, our volunteer bakers and Home for Dinners groups are equipped with everything they need to prepare healthy and home-cooked meals for our families. This essential service saves families significant time and money, allowing parents to focus on being there for their children.

A very exciting addition is the expansion of the Outdoor Amenities, including a fully accessible playground. Additional spaces include a basketball court, natural amphitheatre, gazebo, picnic table area, and a deck with casual seating for dining, relaxing, and visiting.

Overall, this expansion marks a significant step toward more equitable healthcare access for families across the province who need to travel for pediatric hospital care.



FUNDRAISING

Fundraising is essential for RMHC Alberta's sustainability and growth, supporting capital expansion and operational needs. In 2024, our organization faced ambitious fundraising targets on both fronts, and we're proud to report that we exceeded them.

The Big Build capital expansion in Calgary required significant upfront funding to keep the project on track and on budget. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of our team, Capital Expansion Campaign Cabinet, and Board of Directors, we not only met but surpassed our fundraising goals for this initiative.

Simultaneously, we maintained operational funding for our locations in Edmonton, Red Deer, and Medicine Hat. Despite rising costs for essentials like food, power, and fuel, community support enabled us to enhance family programming across all our houses.

This successful balance of capital and operational fundraising in 2024 was truly remarkable. It ensured sustainable funds for our expansion and ongoing services. The impact is evident daily as families can stay together without financial burden, focusing on what matters most—each other.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our community of supporters who made 2024 a banner year for RMHC Alberta.

Powering Support: The Energy Wing at Calgary's Ronald McDonald House®

Ronald McDonald House Charities® (RMHC) Alberta has long been a pillar of support for families facing medical crises. With the recent expansion of its Calgary House, a significant addition has been unveiled: the First Floor Energy Wing. This unique space represents both a commitment to families in need and a powerful collaboration with Alberta's energy sector.

A Vision Inspired by the Energy Industry

THOUGHTS ON OUR STAY

The Dye-Wilson Family Story

It provided a space where
we could cope together, find
strength in one another, and grow
together as a family — and we're
closer now than we've ever been
— as our son Hudson said,

"When one of us fights cancer, we all fight cancer."

When our first son Hudson was born prematurely ten years ago, we spent three weeks at the Ronald McDonald House® in Edmonton. I remember it was a very stressful time. It was our firstborn, and Karemi and I were very thankful for the care and compassion we received during those few weeks. When we took Hudson home, eager to start our life as a family, we never expected that we would be back here nearly a decade later, only this time for a much longer stay. When our daughter Myla was diagnosed with leukaemia last August, just a few months before her 6th birthday, our life got turned upside down.

It's impossible to describe how a diagnosis like Myla's can transform a family's life. Everything changed for us that day; our routine was replaced with often-rushed hospital visits, doctor's appointments, fear and anxiety. The serene family life we had in the country, with Myla and her siblings Hudson (10), Asher (8), and little sister Berkeley (4) was about to change. Our family home is located quite far from the hospital where Myla was being treated. The commute alone was consuming hours of our days, and we had to be ready to transport Myla to the hospital at a moment's notice.

We knew something needed to change – as much as we wanted to stay at home, the challenge of managing Myla's hospital visits with three other kids was too great. In October, we moved full-time into the Edmonton Ronald McDonald House®, where we stayed for six months during Myla's treatment.

For our family, the Ronald McDonald House® was so much more than just a place to stay —it was a sanctuary where our bond grew stronger. Ronald McDonald House® helped provide our family and all the other families we met staying there with a sense of normalcy during what was often a chaotic and uncertain time. As difficult as things were during our stay there, there were also moments that brought us joy.




Every Tuesday, volunteers would come to bake in the kitchen. We can still see our kids lined up alongside the volunteers on step stools, eager to help bake, laughing, and having the time of their lives. There was Pet Therapy Day, when our youngest daughter, Berkeley, would wait eagerly for the new dogs to come in and run up to meet them. And then there were the birthdays — three of our kids celebrated birthdays at the House. When Myla asked for a unicorn mermaid party, the RMHC Edmonton House Staff made it happen. She was thrilled, and so were we. The amazing staff and volunteers we had the privilege of meeting during our stay were incredibly supportive and compassionate. They truly cared and became like an extension of our family.

It is difficult to put into words the difference that staying at the House made for our family. For us, the House was a place of respite, an oasis – a safe haven in a storm. From home-cooked meals to a shuttle service to the hospital to all the special details that the staff took care of, Ronald McDonald House® made an incredibly challenging chapter of our lives so much brighter. It provided a space where we could cope together, find strength in one another, and grow together as a family — and we're closer now than we've ever been — as our son Hudson said, "When one of us fights cancer, we all fight cancer."

Today, we're back home and happy to report that Myla is doing better, taking oral chemo pills, and approaching maintenance. We are thrilled to be home, but recognize how incredibly lucky we were to have stayed at RMHC Edmonton and how all of that was made possible by donors like you.

Your support helped provide a home-away-from-home and most importantly, it helped keep our family together when we needed each other the most – and for that we thank you from the bottom of our hearts.
